9:00 AM

The Lorraine Motel, the site of the assassination of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., is now an impressive museum that honors the legacy of its namesake as well as the civil rights struggle more broadly. Stax Museum of American Soul Music houses more than 2,000 artifacts, with interactive exhibits, films and Isaac Hayes' gold-plated, peacock blue 1972 Superfly Cadillac El Dorado. From 1959 through 1974, this movie-theater-turned-recordingstudio in South Memphis produced a string of hits that still stirs souls today. staxmuseum.com

Guided tours through the historic Sun Studio, opened by rock pioneer Sam Phillips, won't disappoint. Take groups behind the scenes of this meeting place of the "Million Dollar Quartet": Elvis Presley, Johnny Cash, Jerry Lee Lewis and Carl Perkins. MEMPHIS

Overlooking the Mississippi River, Memphis is home of the blues, rock n' roll and, of course, Elvis. Not only has this city made significant contributions to music history, but it is also instrumental in the civil rights movement.
